We have one more very important piece of business to conduct on March 15. On that day, we will have our regular Board Meeting followed by a called “special” meeting to vote on the passage of the Declaration of Condominium. This is an extremely important vote, and we are asking all residents to vote. The vote for passage of the

Declaration requires a 2/3 yes vote. In terms of numbers, we must have 242 yes votes from the 366 units here. This is a very hard total number of votes to achieve, and why it is so critical for each of you to vote. The By-Laws Committee is working hard to get the information and proxies in your hands prior to the March 15 meeting. The committee has removed or changed language in the Declaration which seemed to be objectionable, specifically the language regarding Right to Irrevocable Entry into a Unit and language regarding Pets. Please VOTE!

Congratulations to the newly elected Board—Carmen Lowden, Bill Minion, and Ken Kremer. With returning members Ken Keyes, Beate Du-Mouchel, and Dick Hills, we will work hard to best meet TW’s needs.


We have a magical avocado tree! Planted in 2015, in the fall of 2016 it produced 17 very large
