#### **DID YOU KNOW**

Marcia Napolitan That each unit is to be washed or power washed each year. There are people within the park that will do this for you.

That each unit is to be painted every 10 years. The exterior committee will approve the color you choose and send their written approval. Acceptable colors are in the office.

That owners are to keep all trees, shrubs, and flowers maintained and weeded. Before owners leave to go north, someone is to be under contract to keep these things under control. There are people within the community that do this work. Ask your neighbor for names.

That each unit owner is responsible for informing the contractor of all rules: No loud music, no dogs in their vehicles, no hours on Sunday, and no work before 8 a.m.

That new trees need to be placed a minimum of 8 ft. from any other thing in your yard to permit passage of lawn equipment. Fruit trees go only in the back yard. A listing of acceptable trees may be obtained from the office. That artificial flowers (no matter how nice) are not to be displayed outside.

That your trash and unwanted furniture is not supposed to be at the curb or in your yard before Thursday at sunset. Remember you agreed with the rules when you bought in this community.








#### ALWAYS LOOKING UP!

I was asked to write something about astronomy so I thought I'd start at the beginning. Our universe is over 13.81 billion years old and for the last 68 of those, I've been looking up. I've enjoyed the stars ever since I was a young boy, lying on a blanket at night, mesmerized



by the thousands of stars in the sky. Today's skies aren't as dark as I remember them due to light pollution. I got my first real telescope (Edmund Scientific 4.25 reflector with a pedestal mount) when I was 13. I'd put the scope on my back and climb onto the roof of my parents' house to get a better view of the sky. In my mid 20's I upgraded to a Celestron 8" Schmidt -Cassegrain Telescope and recently, in the last couple of years moved up to a Celestron 8" Evolution series telescope. The Evolution is classified as a "go to" scope which means it has an onboard computer containing a 40,000+ object database and can slew to all the best celestial objects in the sky at a push of a button so locating an object becomes much easier. Last fall I got into astrophotography by purchasing a dedicated astronomy camera. I've shared some of my pictures on the TW Facebook group page. The camera allows me to see the greater details of the stars, planets, and deep space objects by capturing light (Photons) for a longer period of time. I take many short exposure pictures and then stack images (layer them) with my computer for greater detail and clarity. I still enjoy staying outside with my scope (not on my roof) and looking up and enjoying the view. If you see me outside with my scope at night, stop by to check out what I'm imaging, but don't forget to keep your lights off since the headlights ruin what I'm capturing. "Happiness is always looking up!"

#### THE SANDHILL CRANE

The Sandhill Crane (Antigone canadensis) is a species of large North American crane. They are thought to have been around for 2.5 million years according to fossils found in Florida. Named for their migratory stop in the Sand Hills in Nebraska, our "Florida" Sandhill Cranes are nonmigratory.



Sandhill cranes stand about 3 to 4 feet tall, with a wingspan of about 6 feet. Males average 8 lbs. and females 7. Wild sandhill cranes live for about 35 years. Once headed towards endangerment, their populations have held steady or increased over the last few decades. Adults have gray plumage with a white throat and a striking red crown of feathers on their forehead. Juveniles wear a lighter, rusty coat lacking the white and red patches on their head until they are about a year old. Active during the daytime, they spend most of their time resting, foraging for food, or socializing with our residents.

Sandhill cranes are famous for their loud trumpeting calls. They make their trachea shorter or longer and control the pitch of their calls.

Does sandhill crane taste good? At the request of all local cranes, I leave this question unanswered. Plants comprise most of a sandhill crane's diet, though it occasionally eats small mammals or amphibians. They may also eat cultivated food like corn and wheat.

Sandhill cranes typically find their mate during spring migration. Some find their mate as early as

age two, and nearly all are paired by age eight. Males perform a courtship dance and will stretch their wings, leap, and bow. Once the female is satisfied with his performance, the two mate and generally maintain a lifelong bond with their partner. I don't know how the males know when the females are satisfied. The female lays between one and three eggs a year. Chicks are born precocial, or already covered in down and can leave the nest within a day of hatching. They stay with the parents until a couple of months before the following spring.



## NATURALIST CORNER SANDHILL CRANES

Sandhill Cranes are a special sight to me. These large ungainly, yet majestic, birds evoke a regal image with their scarlet crowns. Sandhill Cranes are large (8-10 lbs.) with long necks and legs. They possess a nearly 80 in. wingspan. They are greyish in color but with a possible pinkish hue and they have the characteristic red head. These cranes eat seeds but also some small insects. They are ground nesting birds that prefer open grassland and wetlands. They live to be nearly 20 years old. They are found in Canada and some parts of the western United States during the summer and in Mexico during the winter with their migratory routes covering western and southern areas of the United States.

It turns out the Sandhill Cranes are spotted several times a year in New Hampshire, where I live six months of the year. Their presence seems to be on the rise. I am one person who hopes they become more common in New Hampshire. Meanwhile I will enjoy seeing them here in Tangerine Woods. Keep your ears peeled for their unusual rattling call.



## EASTER TRADITIONS..... WHERE DO THEY COME FROM?

I don't think that you can find anywhere in the Bible that speaks of furry rabbits or decorated eggs as having anything to do with the Easter celebration. So where did these traditions come from?

First, a fun fact about Easter. One piece of "trivia" that I actually didn't have to look up. Easter is a different day each year. So how do they figure out when it falls? Easy. Easter Sunday is the first Sunday after the first full moon after the first day of spring. It can fall anywhere between March 22 and April 25. This year it is April 17.

How was that decided? This I actually had to look up, and I found that the Council of Nicaea decreed this in 325. In case you were wondering... the Council of Nicaea was formed to address the entire body of believers. At that time there was dispute as to whether Christ was divine or was a created being. They declared that He was divine in a statement known as the Creed of Nicaea.

Orthodox Easter is celebrated on the Sunday after the first full moon after Passover (between April 4th and May 8th). This year it is April 24. The traditional Easter dinner menu is a bit different in the Orthodox community, and is Greek in origin. Lamb is roasted, and represents the symbolism of the lamb within Christianity. Hard-boiled eggs are dyed red, to symbolize the blood of Christ. Before the meal they play a game where everyone taps the pointed end of their egg against the pointed end of the person sitting next to them. The object is to crack your opponent's egg without damaging your own. The winners all continue until one person is left with an uncracked egg. This per-

son is believed to have good luck until the next Easter. The cracking of the egg symbolizes the opening of Jesus' tomb when He was resurrected.

Another legend about the use of hard-boiled eggs at Easter is that during lent it was forbidden to eat eggs. Therefore the supply of eggs built up during those 6 weeks. In order to preserve them they were hard-boiled, and were enjoyed as a treat since they had been forbidden for so long.

So how do we end up combining bunnies and eggs? Especially when everyone knows that bunnies don't lay eggs.

According to the University of Florida's Center for Children's Literature and Culture, the Easter bunny traces its roots to 13th Century Germany. At that time they worshipped several gods and goddesses. One of them was Eostra, the goddess of spring and fertility. Feasts in her honor were held on the Vernal Equinox. Her symbol was the rabbit, because of its high fertility rate.

In 1680 the first story about an Easter bunny laying eggs and hiding them in a garden was published.

These legends were brought to the US in the 1700's by German immigrants who settled in Pennsylvania Dutch country. The tradition of making nests for the bunnies to lay their eggs soon followed, and the nests gave way to decorated baskets. The eggs were then joined in the baskets by candies and other treats.
