ABOUT SOME LOCAL WILDLIFE

For those unfamiliar with Florida wildlife, DO NOT FEED THEM. It is against the law and ultimately harms them. There are several creatures that can hurt you, but none that want to and very few inflict real harm. Most think first of alligators. Pets should avoid waterways in Florida. Where there is water, there are alligators. They also walk around, anywhere. Only the largest, over 8 feet, will ever think of humans as food. The worst thing you can do is to feed them. This trains them that humans, and their pets, are a food source. They can find their own food. If they become “friendly”, they will be terminated by FWC.

All snakes eat mice and rats. We love them for that. We do have DiamondBack Rattlesnakes, and they can defend themselves. Simply avoid them. Rarely you may see a snake with colorful bands. If red-touches-yellow, you’re-a-dead-fellow. Avoid that one. If red does not touch yellow, it’s a harmless common corn snake, helpful and friendly.

I fear Fire Ants the most. Their mounds look like little piles of dirt. The ants are so small they’re difficult to see. Do not step on these dirt piles. They pour out by the hundreds to defend their home and climb up your leg. They bite to hold on, then swivel their thorax and sting several times. If this happens to you, first: leave the immediate area. Second: swat off as many as you can. Third: remove all affected clothing, long pants included. Fourth: carefully pick them off before putting them back on. After two days, blisters appear. DO NOT SCRATCH THEM! Rarely, someone is allergic and may need a doctor.

Go out and enjoy Florida nature, take your camera. Mine is busy.

“No,” I replied with a grin. “Only since I installed it.”

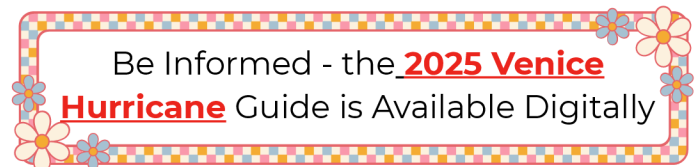
I couldn’t help but laugh, warning her not to look too closely.

This water can then be used to water your lawn or flower beds. Utilizing native plants in your garden is also a natural way to absorb rainwater while promoting a healthy ecosystem.</p>	<p>RECYCLE OR THROW AWAY TRASH</p> <p>Plastic bags, bottles, cigarette butts and other debris can be life-threatening to ducks, fish, turtles, and other animals in their natural habitats. These items can cause serious harm or even death to the creatures that call these environments their home.</p>	<p>LANDSCAPE RESPONSIBLY</p> <p>Transform yard waste into mulch or compost. During heavy rainfall, cover piles of dirt or mulch with tarps to prevent them from being washed away. Sea Turtle Nesting Season is Underway

Mote Marine Laboratory announced that its Sea Turtle Conservation and Research Program (STCRP) has documented the first local turtle activity of the 2025 season.

On April 26, STCRP's Sea Turtle Patrol reported three loggerhead sea turtle nests — one each on Casey Key, Longboat Key and Siesta Key. These early nests mark the start of an important and exciting time for sea turtle conservation along local beaches.

The dedicated individuals of the Sea Turtle Patrol are at the heart of STCRP's conservation mission. Comprising STCRP staff, interns, and more than 300 volunteers, the Patrol began its annual monitoring efforts on April 15, two weeks before the technical start of sea turtle nesting season.

"Even though sea turtle nesting season isn't officially supposed to start until May 1, we begin patrolling early to ensure we catch the first signs of nesting on our beaches," said Melissa Macksey, Senior Biologist and Data Manager of STCRP. "Thanks to our dedicated volunteers, interns, and staff, we're able to cover a large stretch of coastline and monitor for early nesters. We couldn't do it without them."

From April 15 through Oct. 31, the Sea Turtle Patrol conducts daily surveys of 35 miles of nesting beaches, from Longboat Key to Venice. Each morning, they scan the sand for signs of nesting activity and document each nest with care and precision. Their commitment is essential to the success of Mote's long-term nesting research.

Loggerhead sea turtles are a threatened species protected under the U.S. Endangered Species Act. They are the most

commonly observed nesting species in this region, followed by endangered green sea turtles. In recent years, Sarasota County has also occasionally hosted nests from Kemp's ridleys and leatherback turtles.

Throughout the nesting season, STCRP staff and volunteers collect detailed data on nesting activity to track long-term trends and assess critical aspects of sea turtle ecology. These include phenological shifts (changes in the timing of nesting), nest density, hatching and emergence success, nest site selection, and the influence of environmental conditions. As in past years, each nest is marked with yellow stakes and flagging tape to prevent disturbances while data collection continues.

Mote's monitoring has shown encouraging signs in recent years, including rising nest numbers along local beaches. In 2024, Mote documented nearly 4,400 nests from Longboat Key to Venice.

The Problem

Nesting sea turtles once had no trouble finding a quiet, dark beach on which to nest; now they must compete with tourists, businesses and coastal residents for sandy beaches. U.S. beaches, popular with humans and turtles alike, are lined with condominiums, private residences, businesses and hotels. Lights from these developments can be problematic for nesting females and hatchlings.

The lights can discourage females from coming ashore to nest. If a female fails to nest after multiple attempts, she will often resort to a less-than-optimal nesting spot resulting in few, if any, hatchlings surviving from the nest.

Beachfront lighting can also cause sea turtle hatchlings to become disoriented and wander away from the ocean towards the brightest lights. Hatchlings that head toward artificial lights often die from dehydration, exhaustion, terrestrial predation and passing cars.

Choosing Turtle Friendly Fixtures & Lights

Beachfront lighting can be properly managed to benefit humans and sea turtles. In general, a good sea turtle friendly lighting fixture directs light down to the ground where it is needed for safety, shields the light source from being visible from the beach, and is outfitted with a red or amber LED light bulb.

When choosing lighting for your coastal property, please remember these three simple rules:

1. KEEP IT LOW - Low mounting height and low bulb wattage. Flood, spot and pole lighting are highly discouraged.
2. KEEP IT SHIELDED - Use full cut-off fixtures that direct the light down to the ground. Shield fixtures so you cannot see the bulb, lamp or glowing lens.
3. KEEP IT LONG - Sea turtles are less disturbed by the long wavelengths of light (570 nanometers or longer), such as lights that are yellow, amber, or red in color.

Existing problematic lights can be retrofitted with shielding while waiting to be replaced with new sea turtle friendly fixtures. To improve a light that is problematic for sea turtles, shield the fixture so the light source (i.e. bulb) is no longer visible from the beach, make sure all light is being directed down and use a red or amber LED bulb. Shielding a fixture that shines in all directions will actually increase the amount of light reaching the ground where you want it. You can purchase a shield for most fixtures or you can make a shield with materials such as heat dissipating aluminum flashing (available at most hardware stores).

It is estimated that one third of all lighting in the U.S. is wasted in the form of light trespass and sky glow, with an annual expense of approximately 30 million barrels of oil and 2 million tons of coal on unnecessary lights, the cost of wasted lighting is about \$2 billion each year!

An UPDATE regarding Xfinity and lawn care...



Please be aware that Xfinity is in the process of preparing for the installation of the fiber optic infrastructure in our community. As part of this work, installation areas will be clearly marked with PAINT and FLAGS. **These markers should NOT be removed or altered.** In some cases, these marked areas may require sections of lawns to remain unmowed temporarily: once the installation has been completed the flags will be removed by Xfinity and lawn service will resume. The TW Board (and our community) appreciates your understanding and ask that you not interpret this as negligence on the part of our lawn care provider. They are following the guidelines provided by the TW Board. This installation is a huge upgrade for our community and will reduce the frustrations we've had with slow cable and internet disruptions that have increased over the past several years.

Also, for owners who typically handle your own lawn maintenance: please be aware that if you will be away for the summer, your lawn will not be included in the community mowing schedule by default. If you would like to have your lawn maintained during your absence, it is your responsibility to submit a request to be added to the weekly community mowing list. If you do need to report an issue with mowing (remember they cannot fix an issue if they do not know we are displeased) report it here: [LMP Sarasota Branch](#).

How to protect sea turtles

During nesting season, it is important to keep local waters and beaches sea turtle friendly. Sea turtles are swimming just offshore to mate before the females come ashore to nest, juvenile turtles are feeding along the Gulf Coast, and by early summer the first hatchlings will venture into Gulf waters. On the nesting beaches, light from waterfront properties can disorient nesting female turtles and their young, who emerge at night and use dim natural light to find the sea. Beach furniture, trash, and other obstacles can also impede sea turtles and their young.

Onshore

Do:

- If you encounter a nesting turtle or hatchlings, remain quiet and observe from a distance.
- Shield or turn off outdoor lights that are visible on the beach from May through October.
- Close drapes after dark and stack beach furniture at the dune line or, ideally, remove it from the beach.
- Fill in holes that may entrap hatchlings on their way to the water.

Do Not:

- Approach nesting turtles or hatchlings, make noise, or shine lights at turtles.
- Use flashlights or fishing lamps on the beach.
- Encourage a turtle to move while nesting or pick up hatchlings that have emerged and are heading for the water.
- Use fireworks on the beach.
- For more details, please refer to local sea turtle ordinances, including [the City of Venice marine turtle protection ordinance](#) and Sarasota County's marine turtle protection code (which includes Lido, Siesta, Casey, and Manasota Keys).

On the water

- Follow Coast Guard-approved safe boating guidelines and use vigilance to avoid striking sea turtles and other large marine life.
- Be sure to stow trash and line when underway. Marine debris that accidentally blows overboard or out of a truck can become ingested by or entangled around marine life.
- Wear polarized sunglasses to better see marine life in your path.

Emergency contacts

If you see a sick, injured, or stranded sea turtle, dolphin, or whale in Sarasota or Manatee county waters, contact Mote Marine Laboratory's Stranding Investigations Program at 888-345-2335. Outside of Sarasota or Manatee counties, call the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) at 888-404-FWCC (3922). If you suspect that someone is tampering with a sea turtle nest, harassing a sea turtle, or has possession of a sea turtle or any of its parts, please call FWC or Venice Police Department at 941-486-2444. Sea turtles are protected under federal law and any harassment or interference with a sea turtle, living or dead, their eggs and/or nest marking materials is subject to penalty.

The City's Community Resource Officers will be walking the beachfronts at night to look for any potential lighting violators. Residents and visitors to our beaches are also reminded to make sure to remove all items such as beach chairs and trash – in which sea turtles can become entangled – from the beach at night. People should also fill in holes and knock down sandcastles to make the beach safer for sea turtles. If you see lights shining on Venice beaches during nesting season, contact Code Enforcement at 941-882-7549.
