As you read this, Bob and I have been back north for almost a month. Well, that means only four more months til we are in the Sunshine State again.

We all realize that TW is a very giving community, but I wanted to tell you about the generosity that is spread to the three charities which TWERC sponsors yearly.

Adopt-A-Family-

Peg Totman's name is always linked with this charity. She is gone from us but certainly not forgotten. She volunteered with the Sarasota Sheriffs in their south branch. The first link I could find for the Sheriff's Office working with TW was December, 1999. \$1,020 was raised along with a trunkload of non-perishable food, and a full turkey dinner for each of the five adopted Englewood families. The sheriff's deputies contact local schools and agencies to find needy children from Englewood during the Christmas holiday. Two years ago, this TW charity was renamed the Peg Totman Adopt-A-Family. Fast forward to this past Christmas season. After all the donations were in, shopping completed, and wrapping finished, Ann Foster reported that TW helped outfit 34 children with a grand total of \$3,400. 2016 will be our 17th year of working with the Sarasota Sheriffs.



St. Jude Soup Luncheon-

Two women worked long and hard to start this event in TW. Audrey Lindsay was reading a book one summer day, and something she had just read brought an idea to her. She decided she needed to do something for children. Lottie Eashoo, at the same time, was thinking of her friend Audrey, who had been diagnosed with cancer, and she wanted to help. She had been reading about how St. Jude Hospital started by Danny Thomas and prayers to St. Jude. So they both thought St. Jude would be their goal. Since they belonged to a once-a-month luncheon group, they talked to those women and had their committee. Audrey and Lottie pooled their money to purchase the necessary items (tablecloths, napkins, plates, etc.) They asked their committee to each bring a gift for door prizes. After selling tickets to the luncheon, they

realized there were more attending than they planned, so they asked for donations of soup, bread, or cookies. That first luncheon was held in 2007 with 170 attending, and they raised \$1,863 for St. Jude. St. Jude Children's Research Hospital is for children with cancer and other deadly illnesses. They need to raise \$2 million to cover the daily operating costs of the hospital so they can keep their 53-year promise that families will never receive a bill from St. Jude for anything. For the past two years, Charlene Gineo and Mary Tulik were the chairs and sent a check to St. Jude for \$2,495. Charlene found this quote which states the purpose of St. Jude. "After all, these families shouldn't have to worry about losing their life savings. All they should worry about is saving the life of their child" (Continued on Page 2)

I can't believe it is now June and the season is over. However, lots of people still live here in TW full time and are continuing with their happy lives here in Paradise. It would be great if we could have continued participation in our activities which we routinely did together during the winter months. The exercise programs here are perfect for seniors in that they are low impact, a short time period, and make you feel really good. We have Chair Aerobics which is done in a chair that amazingly works your entire body. The Tuesday session is Stretching-abs, legs, waist, arms, and back. The Thursday session is called Strength-aerobics movement, weight training, and balancing while standing at the chair. They last from 40-50 minutes. We also include Chair Yoga on Wednesdays. It too is done in the chair and you do not need to get on the floor. On Monday, Wednesday and Friday, we continue our Water Aerobics program. We use two different audio tapes and the class is done in the shallow end of the pool. Anyone can easily do the moves, and if there is a problem, modification is always possible. Relay For Life-A former resident, Don Weaver, started thinking how TW could help this organization in 2007. In 2008, he put together a plan to begin working with the local chapter during their Relay weekend held at Lemon Bay High School. About the same time, Jacque Cottingham's daughter, Laura, had been diagnosed with cancer. Jacque was looking for a way to honor Laura's struggles. Luminaries became her cause. She felt that all the angels in heaven would surely be happy upon seeing the Luminaries circling the track at Lemon Bay High School. Another resident, Fred Cobb who was President of the Board of Directors, was diagnosed in 2008. With these three spearheading the idea, the TW community pitched in to help. In 2009, Fred was made an Honorary Chairman for the Lemon Bay event. He was the Parade Marshall, driven around the track in a golf cart during the Survivor's Walk that year.

A few years ago, the original chapter split into two groups. In March, 2016, TW held its annual fundraiser for the American Cancer Society. Marilyn Tetrault chaired the event. TW remained a member of the Relay For Life group in Englewood. We were considered a "virtual team" as we held our fundraiser "In-House." We did not establish a team presence at Lemon Bay High School, as in the past years. TW was able to raise \$3,000 through ticket sales for a wonderful Spaghetti Dinner, a 50/50 raffle, beverage sales, and many donations from our generous community members.

Many volunteers make these three charities happen in TW. The residents all open their hearts and wallets for TW to be able to support these benevolent organizations.

SAVING THE MONARCH BUTTERFLIES

Help create awareness of the vanishing Monarch Butterfly. Plant milkweed in your

flower garden. This creates an essential habitat for the beautiful Monarch Butterfly. Milkweed plants are the only source of food for the Monarch caterpillars, but these plants are rapidly disappearing due to land development and widespread spraying of weed killer on the fields.

I want to promote the recovery of the Monarch population now, one milkweed at a time. Please help by planting this in your garden or yard. Various species of milkweed plants can be purchased at our local nurseries. Do not buy milkweed that has been treated with an insecticide.

It is such a joy to see the Monarch Butterflies flying around Tangerine Woods.



REMOVAL OF TILAPIA

In late April, Russ Hoffman of Beautiful Ponds arranged for two

commercial fishermen to remove approximately 400-600 large tilapia from lake #2 at no expense to TW. This was undertaken for two reasons: Overpopulation of tilapia, and erosion of the lake banks. Tilapia are aggressive breeders. They start producing at six months old and can breed every four months with each fish producing 500+ fish a year. Tilapia are non-native with no natural predators. Once they overpopulate and crowd out native species (bass and bluegills), the lakes run out of oxygen which creates a "fish kill" with dead fish covering the lake and shore along with a heavy foul odor. We experienced this about eight years ago. That "fish kill" was caused by cold water which killed only tilapia as bass and bluegills can survive in water colder than 65 degrees. Tilapia create nests near the shoreline. They fan a 20 inch wide by 7 inch deep bowl near and under the Geo-tubes that create our lake banks. Once the tilapia abandon the nests, the shore collapses into the bowl. Hundreds of tilapia creating nests three times a year can undermine the Geo-tubes and erode the shoreline, defeating the purpose of the Geo-tubes. In the future, tilapia will be removed from our three lakes to avoid overpopulation, and to maintain a balance of native fish and tilapia.





LEEANN'S LOG

What I knew about Costa Rica before going there could be told in seconds. I now know that it has 4 and 1/2 million people, more than 3/4 of them Catholic, and all of the rest Christian except for the 10% who profess to be Jewish. The literacy rate is almost 100%. Its 19,500 square miles produces its number one crop coffee, followed by pineapples bananas, mangoes, papayas, rice, beef and much more. The second economic product is technology, followed by tourism. There is very little flat land in Costa Rica, and it has several very beautiful National Parks. That's the academic part of my education about our Central American neighbor. The real education was learning about the people. Did you know that Costa Ricans are the happiest people on earth? I now believe that because even the poorest of the poor have permanent smiles and rate their happiness at a "9" on a scale of 1-10. Pura Vida is not just words to them, it is a way of life. Okay, I went there on a two week vacation, and the reason I chose this destination was the promise of constant activity and adventure. And that's what we got! We were told that the accommodations would be "rustic" but except for a couple of them not having air conditioning, they were delightful surprises. We spent our days hiking, birding, canoeing, kayaking, horseback riding, whitewater rafting, walking through the National Parks viewing and photographing stunningly colored birds, monkeys, sloths, crocodiles, geckos and lizards. We took boat rides down rivers, walks on hanging bridges, and we ziplined from one platform under the forest canopy to another until we completed eleven adrenalin-pumping plunges through the trees to our final stop. We spend a day experiencing the life of the typical Costa Rican. We made empanadas with a local family, sang and danced with a couple dozen school children, ate lunch in the home of a local family, all the while trying to improve our deplorable Spanish. We went to a farmer's market, a pineapple plantation, and a boutique Chocolate Factory. We took mud baths and spent a couple of hours in the hot springs. We visited an active volcano and one of our accommodations was located right in perfect view of another. We did not visit churches, museums, or the usual cultural icons. Except for the tour of their National Theater, our cultural experience was interaction with

the delightful Costa Ricans. And the food—imagine Sea Bass, fresh tuna, Mahi Mahi, and Snook freshly caught that day. Yes, there were more choices than seafood, but the restaurants we ate at were as good as it gets. I have to admit, breakfast was not always my favorite, but I'm a bit of a weird one in that I don't like scrambled eggs, and prefer granola to corn flakes, but everyone else found plenty to keep their tummies happy. This was the best vacation ever, and I'd do it again in a heartbeat.



WHO KNEW?

I interviewed Ned Pingree about our visiting pigs: First, there are a lot more than three pigs visiting TW, and these pigs are not little. The trappers are from Port Charlotte; this is a sideline career for them. They are building contractors. The trappers bring cages—really big cages—how about 10' X 15'? The cages are baited with fermented corn; the corn is scattered from the fence line towards the cages—think of Hansel and Gretel—with the trail of crumbs. One pig was trapped on Monday, and three were trapped on Friday—they each weighed between 60 and 80 pounds. These trapped pigs are not happy; they make a whole lot of noise, they ram the sides of the cage trying to escape, and they show their nastiest side. It is very important that TW residents stay away from these cages; it is very dangerous to be near them. These pigs have razor-sharp tusks and the consequences could be terrible to a resident or a dog if the pigs happened to escape. At the same time, the human scent and/or the scent of a dog will prevent the pigs from entering the baited trap. They may stay away for months at a time. At the moment, there is one very large male (who weighs between 100 and 125 pounds) and three smaller pigs on the loose. What happens to the pigs after they are trapped? They are hog-tied (no pun intended) and put in the back of the trappers' trucks. The trappers are paid a minimal amount by TW; they only want pigs that are alive. The pigs are then sold by the trappers to a butcher who slaughters and sells them to the public for pig roasts. **WHO KNEW?**




