


BILL'S BULLETIN



Cont'd from Page one TW takes care of trimming 185 trees on common grounds. Last year we paid \$22 per tree for trimming. The bids Angie is getting this year range from \$35 to over \$40 per tree. Doing the math means we paid \$4,070 last year and at \$35/tree this year we will pay over \$6,475. That is a \$2,405 increase. As you can imagine this is only one example. TW Writer's Page







Much as TW Blvd. is the backbone of the TW community, the Lateral is the backbone of TW's natural community. Most of us only see the lateral as we drive over the TW Blvd. bridge just south of the 4-way stop intersection.

The lateral is an extensively dredged and channelized replacement of the natural drainage patterns west of Gottfried Creek. Many of Sarasota County's drainage projects were completed through WPA (Works Progress Administration) projects between 1935 to 1943. I am assuming our lateral was dug about 1940 to reduce flooding and turn wetlands and swamp into land suitable for agriculture and cattle farming. It is unlikely that a project like this could happen now with today's more environmentally conscious culture.

Common in our area are coastal-plain willow, wax myrtle, saw palmetto, and Brazilian pepper which can be found along the banks. Adjacent undeveloped habitats include mesic hammocks dominated by oak, slash pine and palms.

We refer to our lateral by many names; the Lateral, the creek, stream, ditch and such. Some proper names include Gottfried Creek and Goldfish Creek. Officially, it is The North Englewood Drainage Lateral, a drainage channel. The property, 100 feet wide, containing the waterway and the abutting land is owned by the TWOA but Sarasota County maintains a 100 foot drainage easement. This includes the waterway and land on both sides.

During average conditions, the water surface drops about 1.4 feet from SR 776 to TW Blvd., then another 0.7 feet to the double bridge at the powerlines on its way to Gottfried Creek and Lemon Bay. The state tests the water periodically and the county sprays the surface

vegetation and mows the banks about twice a year. Reports online state that the water quality is "fair to poor." I heard rumor that the county dredges the lateral every three years, and hope they remove what they dredge.

All this maintenance causes trauma to the local wild plants and animals, but it is needed and we just have to live with it. Without it, flooding would pose a real threat to us. It is important that we do not feed the animals or birds. It is especially important that we do not feed the alligators. Doing so trains them to connect food with humans, and that is very bad for the alligators as they will be removed and killed if they become threatening. My hobby is photographing nature along the lateral area; watching wildlife swim, fly, roost, search for food and multiply. My alias is Tangerine Woodsman.

I hope that all TW residents, their families and guests will take time to walk this area or ride your cart (where permitted). You can access our green spaces from TW Blvd. at the lateral bridge or from the end of Arbordale Court. While walking the Lateral easement, be sure to include the Nature Trail, Nature Preserve and the huge FLAG property which connects to the far end of the Nature Trail. Having these green spaces so close to us is a real blessing.












HAPPINESS IS ALWAYS LOOKING UP PART 2 By Gary Siegel



In my last article I talked about my interest in astronomy and how it began. This time I'd like to talk about what's involved in taking Astro pictures, the images you might have seen on the TW Facebook group page. There are many different

types of astrophotography, from wide-angle sky, Milky Way photography, Landscape astrophotography, Time-lapse astrophotography, Solar system "planets" photography, to deep-sky astrophotography through an astronomical telescope. The basic elements of this hobby include the understanding of timed "long" exposure images, proper focus, and image processing. The challenge of deep sky photography is the setup required to capture nebulas, galaxies, and other astronomical objects. All require the use of a dedicated camera, solid equatorial mount, telescope, computer/laptop, and specialized software. There are simple ways to get started in astrophotography that don't require a large investment of time or money. For instance, with a basic DSLR camera and a tripod, landscape images of the Milky Way and the Planets are well within your reach. Whether you're shooting a full moon, lunar eclipse, meteor shower or a favorite constellation of stars, the sensitivity and control of modern camera sensors are well suited for astronomical imaging. If you think of astrophotography as you would any new hobby, you need to practice and be patient. Practice finding objects, tracking them and experimenting taking different exposure lengths in light polluted skies. You need patience while learning the limits of your gear, (what you can and cannot image in certain locations), how complicated

imaging software works, and waiting for that clear non-windy or moonless night to photograph. Astrophotography is a skill that needs to be developed and that takes time. I'd like to think that astrophotography builds character. For me, my passion lies in deep-sky astrophotography using a dedicated astronomy camera and a telescope. It evolved over the years from casual viewing with an eyepiece to capturing long exposure images. There's so much more detail that comes from an image than looking through an eyepiece.





I was hooked with my first Astro image (which wasn't very good) but it opened my eyes to what I can see. My pictures may have been fuzzy, blurry blobs of light, but I knew that I was photographing another galaxy millions of light years away and that just blew my mind. The ability to capture incredibly detailed portraits of deep-sky objects such as a nebula, galaxies, supernovas really got my heart racing. The learning process never ends. The small milestones and gradual progress along the way are what motivates me to continue pushing forward. One look at a typical deepsky imaging setup may seem a little complex and have you scratching your head at first but my backyard setup did not happen overnight. In my next article I'll go into what I use.

ELÉPHANT STEW

INGREDIENTS:

Place in large pot

Add enough brown gravy to cover
